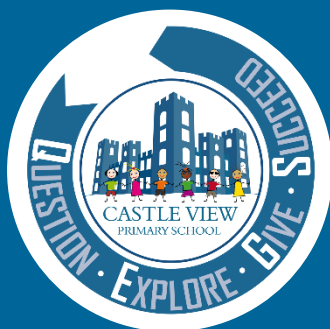


Castle View Primary School and Nursery for pupils aged 2-11 years

Our School and Nursery

The Nursery hosts up to 60 children in a large open plan space with extensive grounds including our very own Forest school garden and mud kitchen.

The school buildings hosts 120 children in both pure and mixed year groups (5-11 years).

We have a large school site, consisting of: 6 buildings including a separate dining hall, P.E. hall, Early Years unit and Key Stage 1 and 2 building as well as a large school field, with captivating views of Riber Castle.

But most importantly we have a very talented team of people!

Our team consists of highly qualified EYFS teachers and teaching assistants to ensure the best quality of education and experience possible. We have a specialist team of Forest School practitioners as well as 'Real Play' researchers and practitioners to deliver high quality learning through play, developing pupil's curiosity, knowledge and risk taking; ensuring every moment counts and is child centered.

Adults in our Nursery are friendly, approachable and always on hand to help.

Nursery - The Early Years (0-5)

Both Nursery and Reception children follow the Early Years Framework (EYFS), which is a play based approach to learning. The Nursery and Reception classes learn together in our Early Years Units, to ensure consistency, success and a smooth transition across the Early Years. The indoor and outdoor areas have been designed to support and develop your child's learning. The curriculum is tailored to build on the interests of each child and ensure that children enjoy playing and learning together, build strong relationships and develop key skills. These include becoming more familiar with learning to read, write and use numbers confidently, as well as spark their curiosity and problem solving skills.



The Early Years doors open at 9am for morning sessions and 12.30 for afternoon sessions. We invite you to stay and play with your child, encouraging them to engage in activities set up at the tables. The learning opportunities always link to our current topic /theme and will build on your child's interests and carefully planned to develop key skills and build on prior learning.

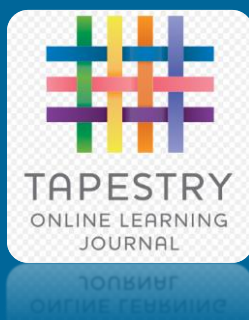
The Early Years Curriculum

Your child will be working on the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Curriculum. This is made up of 7 areas of learning.

The Nursery staff will keep a record of your child's learning through a 'Learning Journal', photos and 'post it' observations. These will be kept inside their very own learning book. All of this will link to the Early Years Framework.

Parents are welcome to read these at the start of any day/session so that they can keep track of their child's learning and development.

We use an online system 'Tapestry' which enables parents to add to their child's learning journey at home too.

Please note wrap around provision is available from 8.00-9.00 and from 3.30-6.00.

Breakfast and after school care can be added to your child's day with us.

What do I need for Nursery?

We encourage children to explore a wide range of activities. These can sometimes be wet and messy, which adds to the fun! We suggest you pack your child a rucksack containing spare clothes i.e. pants, socks, t-shirt and trousers, just in case!

At Nursery we like to access the outdoor area in all weathers, and therefore we have sets of waterproof coats and trousers for children to wear. We do have spare wellies; however, we welcome you to bring in a pair of wellies for your child to wear which can be kept at Nursery on the rack.

Our Nursery staff plan and deliver a 'forest school' and 'real play' approach to learning therefore please expect your child to be out in all weathers. So please send your child in clothing for **all weathers**, there is nothing more fun than splashing in puddles, making mud pies, trying new challenges and taking managed risk; all of which develop creativity, imagination and conversation!

Whatever the weather learning matters!

We realise that it's not always possible for children to be potty trained in time to start Nursery. If this is the case, please send your child with their preferred nappies and wipes. We'll work with you on this, at your child's pace – don't worry we expect accidents so please send extra clothes, it's all part of the learning process. Please note all policies for personal care and practices are available to all parents, please just ask and a copy will be provided.

Funding Entitlements and optional extras

Our Nursery is open to children from the age of 2, some families qualify for funded 2 year old places, others can pay for sessions to suit them.

All 3 and 4-year-old children are entitled to 15 Universal Nursery hours. These can be arranged through the week to suit your circumstances. Some families qualify for 30 hours free childcare, we're able to offer these places too. Nursery funding normally starts the term after the child's 2nd or 3rd birthday. Paid sessions can start as soon as they are of age.

It's possible to mix and match funded sessions and paid sessions and we have wraparound available too, we'll tailor your childcare to fit what you need.

How to Pay



We use a secure online system called ParentPay for any fees outside of your entitlements.

We are able to accept most Childcare vouchers, The Government Tax Free Childcare Scheme and Childcare Grant Payment Service, please let us know if you would like to use any of these.

The National Curriculum

Through a strong curriculum, we endeavor to prepare our children for a future in an ever changing world.

We have developed an inspiring curriculum based on the National Curriculum expectations and pupils needs. Learning is launched by 'hooks', to create curiosity and interest. These may be special trips, activities or visitors in to school, which all help children to understand their learning in greater depth and inspire them to learn even more!

We believe that a love for learning means children succeed and develop a passion and thirst for more.

We are dedicated to enriching the lives of our children and offer opportunities to extend their interests beyond the national curriculum. These include violin and singing lessons, Opportunities to perform, crocheting, sewing and weaving, calligraphy, local studies, Intergenerational projects and many more.

School - The National Curriculum (5-11)

The National curriculum consists of English, Maths, Science, History, Religious Education, Geography, Art and Design, Music, Physical Education, Design and Technology, Computing and Personal, Social, Health, and Citizenship Education, which are all brought to life by the staff to make them exciting and engaging.

A wide range of teaching styles are used to support children's learning. Children may be taught in small groups or individually as well as a whole class depending on the appropriateness of the learning and the impact this will have on them.

English

Literacy is taught daily, both in directed teaching, but also implicitly in all other subjects. It's hard to teach any subject without literacy...it's all around!

The school currently uses a range of reading schemes and real books to ensure children have access to high quality fiction and non-fiction books both in class as well as in our school library. Books that are sent home are banded by colour (unless the child is a free reader) to help develop their understanding and love of reading.

We teach reading and spelling through daily lessons, in each class, using a combination of resources linked to the national guidelines for phonics - 'Letters & Sounds'. As the children grasp their phonetic knowledge and can blend words successfully, we continue to develop the children's use of spelling patterns. The teaching of reading and writing is through an immersion of high quality texts, which the children discuss, act out, draw, ask and answer questions to ensure they fully understand. All of this supports them in developing high quality writing.

Mathematics

Mathematics is taught daily and every opportunity is made for maths to be applied in all subjects, for example measuring in science, geography, design and technology etc. Children are taught to become fluent in mathematics, using a range of both mental and written methods. Carefully planned resources are used to ensure children understand their learning. Focus is placed on children becoming fluent in using the four operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Shape, space, measure and handling data are taught through thematic approaches.

Termly Topics

Class teachers produce termly parent flyers to provide you with an overview of the learning that will be taking place, these include information about key dates, such as homework dates (when given and when to be returned) as well as any special notes that you may find helpful.

Educational Visits.

Throughout the year there are likely to be day visits organised for classes in conjunction with their thematic work, or visits to school by theatre groups or workshops etc. Such visits play an important part in the school curriculum, extending the learning that is started in the classroom and no child is excluded for financial reasons. We do have to ask parents for support to enable these to happen. Parents are invited to make voluntary contributions towards the cost of these visits to enable the school to continue with such worthwhile enrichment. Details of the approximate cost will be sent home and, providing we are able to get the necessary support, we will confirm bookings. There will always be provision to pay by instalments.



How do we ensure a full curriculum and enrich every child's life?

Enriching our children's lives is very much part of our ethos. We believe life is full of opportunities to learn in a variety of ways. We have a range of weekly 'enrichment' sessions in all classes, which include, singing, drumming, cookery, outdoor learning, craft making, young enterprise groups, as well as sport activities and gardening; all which, we believe raises children's confidence and self-esteem. Learning new skills, in a supportive environment means our children are willing to challenge themselves with confidence. We use our very strong links with local secondary schools and other primary schools to further deepen the opportunities our children have to try new sports, participate in team games and competitive sports. Children are encouraged to always improve on their personal best, with support and encouragement. Our children are amazing!

What do we assess, when and why?

Children's learning is assessed all of the time, through observations in class, discussions with the children and through their work. Assessing and reflecting on learning is paramount to enable staff to plan and deliver lessons that move learning on. In addition to this there are some periods of formal testing, defined by the government. These are:

- At the end of Reception. Children are assessed against the Early Years framework.
- Year 1 children's phonic knowledge is assessed, by taking a phonic screening check.
 - At the end of Year 2 children are assessed in English, Mathematics and Science against National standards.
- At the end of Year 6 children sit a series of tests in Reading, Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar and Mathematics. (SATS)

Writing and Science Are Teacher assessed against National standards.



School lunches

Our Catering service 'Caterlink' make delicious, healthy school dinners using fresh produce. There is always a wide choice of main course (hot and cold options), salads and desserts. One of the options is always suitable for vegetarians. Lunches cost **£2.05** per day. Please let us know of any special dietary requirements

The menu is displayed in school and on the school website.

Children who do not have a school dinner may bring a packed lunch and drink. Drinks must not be in glass bottles for safety reasons. If parents prefer, the kitchen are happy to prepare a sandwich for lunch instead of the hot option.

Please label all packed lunch boxes.

All children in Reception and Key Stage 1 receive a free school lunch. If you have a child in Key Stage 2 and think they may be eligible for a free school meal, please complete a form at the office. The school receives valuable funding for all pupils who are entitled to a free school meal. All of this money is spent directly on the children. So if you think you might be eligible, please apply!

What do I need for school?

Uniform.

At Castle View Primary School, we are proud of ourselves and our school community. We believe wearing uniform supports this. Our uniform reflects the colours of our School Badge. Our policy is that pupils wear:

- White Polo shirt or shirt.
- Navy school sweatshirt or cardigan , with school logo.
- Grey or black trousers or skirt.
- In summer, girls may wear blue checked dresses.
- Black shoes and we ask that children are not sent to school wearing shoes with open toes, high or wedged heels or trainers.

Jewelry should not be worn, other than a watch. Children with pierced ears must wear small studs for safety reasons. During PE sessions these will be taped to avoid accidents (if a child is unable to remove them).

If your child is sent to school wearing inappropriate footwear, you will be contacted and asked to bring in alternatives.

P.E. kit

White T-shirt, black shorts and trainers for outdoor sports and pumps for indoor P.E.

Tracksuits may be worn in cold weather.

If you require any assistance with uniform, please contact the office.

Please could you ensure that all items of clothing are clearly marked with your child's name. Trying to match a jumper to its owner can be very challenging when not named!

Special Educational Needs

From time to time some children need a little bit more support. Learning difficulties are sometimes identified before a child enters school or during their school life.

If a parent thinks that their child may be experiencing a difficulty, please convey these thoughts to the class teacher as soon as possible. A programme of support may be devised if appropriate.

It may be necessary to call on outside agencies such as speech and language therapy, educational psychologists or behaviour support. This course of action would only be taken following consultation with you as a parent. Please see our Special Educational Needs Policy in school for detailed information.

Gifted and Talented pupils

Our approach to supporting and developing gifted and talented pupils is one of working closely with parents to identify in what way they may be gifted or talented. Your child may demonstrate a range of talents or skills; musically, artistically or physically. They may have talent in drama, in leadership, organizational and analytical abilities, as well as in an area of the curriculum. All of which we strive to harness and enhance by providing greater challenge within class, through enabling children of similar ability to work together and by providing enrichment opportunities.



Behaviour

At Castle View Primary School, we believe that respect and a high standard of behavior is expected at all times. Staff, parents and pupils are role models to one another. Throughout school positive praise and rewards are used to promote and reward expected behaviour.

Our very own 'Castle Coin' currency is used throughout school, by all staff to ensure behaviour is consistently rewarded. We have a weekly shop, where children can exchange their Castle View Coins for well-earned rewards.

If a child's behaviour is unacceptable, then staff work with the child during reflection time to try to discuss the behaviour, what went wrong and how to resolve the situation. They give strategies to help the child in the future.

Aggressive or abusive behaviour will not be tolerated under any circumstances.

Please feel free to see our behaviour policy for full details of the rewards and sanctions that are in place. This is available from the school office or on the school website.

Breakfast Club and After School Club

We provide before and after school care to help parents and carers.

Our breakfast club takes place in the activity room from 8.00am daily where children get a choice of breakfast and a range of activities.

Our after school club runs from 3.30pm till either 5pm or 6pm, The children will take part in a variety of activities such as baking, crafts and sports. To book please let the office know before 1pm on the day.

Places can fill up fast so to save disappointment please plan ahead!

Activities

We aim to be outside whenever the weather allows.

Attendance, Illness and Absence

It is important for continued learning that children have as fewer days away from school as possible. Under the new national regulations, holidays are not allowed during term time. Leave during term time may only be granted under exceptional circumstances. If this is not granted a fine may be issued.

It is helpful if you could let school know on the first day of absence if your child is ill and will not be attending.

Mrs Travis is our Pastoral Manager she oversees attendance and who may be able to help you if you are having any difficulties. Please feel free to chat with her.

- If your child becomes ill whilst at school a member of staff will contact you. Please make sure we have up to date contact details, as there is nothing more distressing for a child who is ill, when parents can't be reached. Often a cuddle from a parent/carer can make all the difference.
- If your child has sickness/diarrhoea please keep him/her at home for 48 hours.
- Children from time to time have minor accidents at school. If this occurs treatment will be given, it will be recorded at school and parents will be informed.
- If your child needs to take medication whilst at school it is essential that a medical form is completed. These are available from the school office.



Religious Education

The school has no particular religious affiliation. Children are taught an awareness of Christianity and other religions and faiths.

The aim of RE is to develop respect and understanding for others, their stories, symbols, buildings, festivals, founders and beliefs thus creating an atmosphere which is free from racism and racist attitudes. In our Religious Education lessons, the children learn about the major religions of the world. They look at how religion affects the lives of believers and discover how it inspires people in their thinking and actions.

Parents may, if they wish, withdraw their child from religious worship and RE lessons. Please contact the school office if this is the case.

Sex and Relationship Education

At Castle View Primary School, the aim of our Sex and Relationship Education program is to promote and develop a greater understanding of the personal, physical and emotional changes the children will experience, to equip them for adult life. An essential part of this is to teach children about positive relationships. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from all or parts of sex education except from that which is required as part of the Science National Curriculum.

Freedom of information

We keep many records of pupil's progress and details to ensure we have a true overall picture of each and every child. In some cases, we share information with other professionals to ensure the protection and safety of the children in our care and to comply with legal obligations. All information and records kept on a child are accessible by any parent who wishes to see them. These can be seen via contacting the school in writing, further details are available via our Data protection compliance policy.

Who can help?

All staff at Castle View Primary and Nursery are here to help in any way they can. But these people might be just who you need:

Child Protection and Safeguarding.

Our role in protecting and keeping children safe is and will always be our first priority. The Pastoral Manager and Headteacher are the main safeguarding officers, however all staff in school have responsibility for keeping every child safe. The school has a legal duty to monitor the protection of the pupils in its care. We are legally obliged to identify and deal with any sensitive issues when necessary to protect children from physical, emotional or sexual abuse or neglect. Information between professionals may be shared in the interests of pupil safety.

Equality

The Governing Body's policy is to provide education fairly to all pupils within the school and to give equal treatment to its employees, pupils and members of the community regardless of their age, disability, medical status, marital status, ethnicity, religion, gender, sexual orientation, or national origin.

We believe the person matters and that each and every one should be treated with respect and dignity.

We:

- Develop an awareness of the responsibility of everyone to promote equal opportunities for all.
- Are pro-active in ensuring all children feel equal to one another
- Respect each other's differences
- Raise self-esteem to enable children to accept their entitlement for equal opportunities.
